Dear Friends,

I doubt whether those who signed the Armistice in 1918, in a railway carriage in a French forest, could possibly have imagined the development of such a significant annual and global act of remembrance.

After all, the colossal loss of life led many to believe that the Great War would be the war to end them all. But sadly we didn't listen. Tragically history has kept on repeating itself. Once again we gather to remember not just those who died in that war but in all other conflicts since.

In my experience, these occasions go beyond remembering the generous sacrifice of our armed forces. Our own mortality is captured by them, those we have loved and let go are recognised, the dashed hopes and shattered dreams we once entertained are recalled.

So the two minute silence we share is about more than the horrors of war and the ultimate price for freedom. This pause in a hectic world is a symbol of our spiritual need to be still; the formal silence, a prompt to the memory which helps us

mourn our losses; and the poppy we wear, among other things, an acknowledgement of the limitations of human existence.

And there is more to us than remembrance. We are creatures of hope who long to hear the music of the future. We understand that simply to recall the past is not necessarily to deal with it. Things need to change. The world is still not free of tyrants and despots, our lives are still broken and we ache for the day when God's new day will dawn. So we reach out beyond our finite horizons to connect with the God whose everlasting Kingdom of justice and peace will come.

We, whose days are like the momentary splendour of a flower, are invited to know the God who is the eternal home of all those who trust Him. As we enter this season of remembrance I suggest you use the words of a hymn written by Fred Kaan as a prayer for the world—

God! As with silent hearts we bring to mind
How hate and war diminish humankind
(Singing the Faith 698).

Dear Friends,

One of the aspects of Methodism that I value is how all decisions are made at conference level where lay and ordained share and discuss on our behalf. On occasions the conference defers items of significance back to Districts and Circuits for further conversation and consideration.

This summer the Methodist Conference has invited Circuits to discuss Marriage and Relationships to help inform the conversation at the 2016 Conference in London.

Essentially the Conference will discuss:

1. whether the 1992 Conference Statement 'A Christian Understanding of Family Life, the Single Person and Marriage' should be updated.
2. whether to revisit the question of embarking upon a process of revising the Methodist Church's definition of marriage.

In order to have an informed discussion on these questions at Conference, we need to let them know our thoughts.

The report to conference last year encouraged districts, circuits and churches to explore recent changes in legalisation on marriage, the history of marriage, cohabitation, the welcoming of same sex couples in church, and homophobia, and to facilitate this conversation. This is the conversation to which you are invited on **Nov 15th at Keighley Shared Church beginning at 3pm culminating in a service at 6pm.** We hope that our conversations will be led by Rev Barbara Glasson.

Revd Ruth Crompton, present minister of Farnhill, conducted the service together with Revd Alan Raine and Revd Ken Beardsley, both of them previous ministers. The chapel was full with people travelling from far and wide to share in the occasion. Organist Mr John Taylor had made a CD of organ music as a memento, which for a small donation, people could take away, proceeds of which went to The Forget Me Not Charity. Farnhill members have over the past 8 years supported the work of The Gambian Schools Trust and a local member of the charity Linda Gunn received a cheque for £200 from the Methodists bringing the grand total to £4,500 raised by this small yet faithful community. Whilst the chapel building may have closed the members will continue to meet twice a month in Farnhill Institute just across the road from the Chapel. They will meet every second Saturday for a coffee morning, proceeds of which will continue to go to The Gambian Schools Trust, and the Thursday prior to the Coffee Morning for a new venture called "Let's talk about..." A discussion group that will meet about everyday events and activities and share their thoughts in the light of faith. This is open for anyone to come along to and the first meeting will be on November 12th at 2pm.

People who had worked in the project, staff with over 35 years of work and caring for women and children who had lived at Blenheim, and many who had been part of the caring and sharing, giving voluntary time and money to help resources in housing and many ways.

It was a privilege to see so many people, and so many of the women and children who had been helped to find a home and move on in their life with the care plus love to the children. At speech time we heard many stories, they were told with thankfulness, laughter and fun.

One young lady came forward almost at the end and she asked could she speak? In her opening words she told of how she had come "In the Night" to Blenheim. Her father had once again come home very drunk, and both mother and daughter were very distressed. However someone had told her to go to Blenheim and seek help, so they had already got ready to leave the house and went to the project. They found care and after years of abuse they were given help and care. The girl was encouraged back to school, for she had run away, her extra help there moved her on to Bradford Girls Grammar and on to University - now she works in 'Parliament'. She wanted to say thank you to all who had helped re-settle them, and her mother had also come to the meeting today.

What a testament for that girl to give, and we all thanked God for the many who had come to offer thanks, for lives encouraged and finding new lives. Many stories could be told.

Our past chairman came - Kathleen Richardson. She had heard of the closing and said she must be there, so came on a 'day-return'. When she came into the meeting she recognised the girl who works in the 'Westminster House' and went to speak to her.

What a wonderful day to be there in this meeting. Often we may feel how God is at work in our lives, and maybe we never know, but at times we rejoice together, and thank God for the way in which he uses our work and prayers, when we work with Him offering love and prayers to His people. This day will be long remembered, may we be encouraged to work for the Kingdom of God
